

## **ISSUE: PROFESSIONAL LICENSURE EFFICIENCY**

## **BACKGROUND**

In the United States, state governments have jurisdiction for issuing most professional licenses to individuals and corporations.

Fields that are regulated and licensed vary among individual states. Among regulated fields are health care professionals (medical doctors, nurses); psychologists; lawyers; teachers; surveyors; engineers; social workers; occupational therapists; architects; tradesmen (plumbers, electricians); and certain service industry workers (bartenders, massage therapists, barbers). The fundamental purpose of licensure and registration is to protect the public.

Over time, licensing boards can become "anti-competitive" in their actions which can prevent or raise barriers to new entrants into the profession or industry, and licensing procedures can raise costs for services that entrepreneurs and their employees need.

## **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- Creating a more efficient and effective licensure process for many professions in West Virginia could generate budgetary savings for the State of West Virginia.
- Examine the professions that require a license and replace licensing with a less onerous form of regulation where public health is not seriously threatened.
- Encourage the legislative and executive branches to execute on WV Code §30-1-15. Office of executive secretary of the health profession licensing boards; appointment of executive secretary; creating a more efficient and effective licensure entity for health related professions.
- Encourage utilization of §30-1-19. Combining board staff functions to create a more effective and efficient licensing procedures for licensing boards not covered in §30-1-15.
